






Homegoing Yaa Gyasi


Sister Outsider Audre Lorde

A collection of fifteen essays written between 1976 and 1984 gives clear voice to Audre Lorde's literary and philosophical personae.




I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings Maya Angelou

Captures the longing of lonely children, the brute insult of bigotry, and the wonder of words that can make the world right.




Dreams from My Father Barack Obama

Legacy: A Black Physician Reckons with Racism in Medicine






Isabel Wilkerson

One of the great untold stories of American history: the decades-long migration of Black citizens who fled the South for northern and western cities, in search of a better life.




The Hate U Give Angie Thomas

Inspired by the Black Lives Matter movement, this is a powerful and gripping YA novel about one girl's struggle for justice.




Let Us Descend Jesmyn Ward

A haunting masterpiece, sure to be an instant classic, about an enslaved girl in the years before the Civil War.




Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents Isabel Wilkerson

Examining the unspoken caste system that has shaped America and shows how our lives today are still defined by a hierarchy of human divisions.




Invisible Man Ralph Ellison

Spellbinding and dazzlingly innovative portrait of a woman haunted by the past.




The Love Songs of W.E.B. Du Bois Honorée Fanonne Jeffers

A story of a young black girl named Sula, who matures into a strong and determined woman in the face of adversity and the distrust.




A kinetic adventure tale of one woman's ferocious will to escape the horrors of bondage and a shattering, powerful meditation on the history we all share.






The Water Dancer Ta-Nehisi Coates

A dramatic story of an atrocity inflicted on generations of women, men, and children and the war they waged to simply make lives with the people they loved.




The Hundred Thousand Kingdoms N.K. Jemisin

After her mother's mysterious death, a young woman is summoned to the floating city of Sky in order to claim a royal inheritance she never knew existed.




Feminist Theory: From Margin to Center bell hooks

A sweeping examination of the core issues of sexual politics; hooks' new book argues that the contemporary feminist movement must establish a new direction for the 1980s.




The Fifth Season N.K. Jemisin


Ain't I a Woman: Black Women and Feminism bell hooks

A groundbreaking work of feminist history and theory analyzing the complex relations between various forms of oppression.




Kindred Octavia E. Butler

The Bluest Eye Toni Morrison



A breathtaking poetry collection on hope, heart, and heritage from the most prominent and promising Black poets and writers of our time






Chain-Gang All-Stars Nana Kwame Adjei-Brenyah

Weaving together multiple strands and generations of this family, a story that is at once a riveting, emotional family story and a brilliant exploration of the American history of passing.




The Known World Edward P. Jones


Legendborn Tracy Deonn


Deacon King Kong James McBride

The funny, sharp, and surprising story of the shooting of a Brooklyn drug dealer and the people who witnessed it.




Nobody Knows My Name lames Baldwin





A dynamic look at several Black inventors and innovators who shared a desire to improve people's lives.




Jubilee: Recipes from Two Centuries of African **American Cooking** Toni Tipton-Martin



The Year of the Witching Alexis Henderson


A young woman living in a rigid, puritanical society discovers dark powers within herself in this stunning, feminist fantasy debut.






Honey & Spice Bolu Babalola

A mystery about a Black classical musician whose family heirloom violin is stolen on the eve of the most prestigious classical music competition in the world.




Nightcrawling Leila Mottley
